SERMON: "HOW CAN WE SPEAK THE TRUTH IN LOVE?"

To begin with, I believe we want to speak the truth in love as a means of encouragement, to help people grow in their self-confidence to help others.

Whoever you are, whatever you are doing, don't you appreciate it when you're trying your very best to accomplish something worthwhile, but let's face it, you're struggling, and the situation seems hopeless, and you want, with every fibre of you're being to give up.; then, someone comes alongside you and says, "You can do it! Don't give up! Keep going you can make it!"

Maybe you appreciate that kind of encouragement, maybe not.

I remember a long time ago in the last century (and some of you may remember as well), when I believe it was the young sixteen-year old girl, Marilyn Bell, who was attempting to swim across Lake Ontario.

I may have some of the details incorrect (I haven't looked it up on the Internet), but join me for a moment if you will in this memory.

We're huddled around the radio. We're listening to a the announcer giving us a blow-by-blow description of Marilyn battling unbelievable tiredness and exhaustion at night in the cruel, cold, and unforgiving waters of Lake Ontario, . . . stroke by stroke, . . . terrified of swimming through what she might have perceived were poisonous jelly fish.

Her coach, Cliff Lumsden (I believe), was nearby in a boat and maybe some of Marilyn's family, friends and officials too (making sure everything was on the up-and-up); and here was Marilyn, trying to follow the grotesque yellow beam of light supposedly guiding her, just ahead . . and our Marilyn was begging her coach and all that would listen to her, . . . begging them to take her out of the water-perhaps certain (in her mind), she was going to die a death by drowning at any moment.

Yet they encouraged her to swim on.

I ask you, 'Were they speaking the truth in love' as a means of encouragement?

Friends, I want to submit to you this morning, that we can trust Scripture.

'God is love', 'Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life', as shared with us by the Apostle John.

And, surely as we pray, the Holy Spirit speaks the truth to us in love when we listen carefully and are obedient to him.

Praise the Lord, the Psalmist tells us.

Amos tells us the LORD will never forget any of their works.

Friends shall we not be faithful to the Lord in our journey?

Lately, our beloved Queen Elizabeth II passed. By her own words at her coronation she wanted to serve God and her people for life.

In our own lives, friends, shall we not serve the Lord by speaking the truth in love by the power of the Holy Spirit and as an encouragement to all who have ears to hear.

Let us focus our prayers on this most worthy goal! Amen.
