SERMON Hard Boiled Eggs and other Recipes

I've got a cooking question for all of you this morning?

Do you know how to make the perfect hard-boiled egg?

Chances are every single one of you feels
you know how to make a boiled egg just the way you like it,
a perfect breakfast, lunch or even dinner.

You may find it a bit of a surprise then, as I did,
that if you Google;
"How to boil a Perfect Egg"
there are more than 20 pages of sites, videos, and instructions from regular at-home cooks
to world renowned chefs,

all trying to teach us how to cook that perfectly boiled egg.

How could there be so many opinions

on something we all already think we know how to do?

I decided to watch Jamie Oliver's video

on how to make the Perfect hard-boiled egg

just to see how his advice compares to my own ideas on the subject.

Jamie claims his way of cooking an egg is 'rock solid',

promising an egg "cooked to perfection absolutely every single time."

To begin with he talks about all the variables

involved in cooking an egg,

which to be honest I never really thought about.

He explains that the size of the egg matters,

and the temperature of that egg

before we even start to boil it matters.

He also points out that the size of our pot matters

and the amount of water in that pot also matters.

To be honest I never have considered any of this.

I just grab an egg from the fridge and throw it into my usual egg-boiling pot.

Jamie also says that he hears lots of really random ideas

about how to make a perfectly boiled egg

and as I watched his video

I started to think perhaps my own techniques were a bit random.

Next time I am going to try it his way,

and you may want to try it too;

I'm going to start with a room temperature, large egg.

I'm going to dip it 3 or 4 times into the boiling water on a slotted spoon

and then gently place it into the pot of lightly salted water.

For soft boiled eggs I'll wait for 71/2 minutes,

for hard boiled, the way I like them best,

I'll give them 11 minutes.

And then I'll eat my egg right away

before it has time to cook more inside its own shell.

I hope you have all had some breakfast before coming to hear the sermon this morning!!!!

And what pray tell,

does cooking the perfect boiled egg

have to do with our scriptures today?

This morning we have both the First Testament account of Moses, in his farewell speech, giving Israel the Law, or the ten commandments, and then in our Gospel we have Jesus reiterating some of those very same words in a debate with those gathered around to discuss theology and living, in their own time.

Humanity has a sort of love/hate relationship with commands, laws, rules and recipes.

On one hand give us the tried and true way,

or as Jamie Oliver says,

"the rock solid recipe to cook an egg to perfection every single time."

Let's take out the guess work, and the mistakes.

Let's avoid the cracked oozing eggs and the greeny-black rings on yolks.

Let's skip that costly, frustrating, chaotic bit and get strait to a perfect breakfast.

On the other hand what if I have no pot,

or no drinking water suitable to boil an egg in?

And what if I have no eggs? – could only get my hands on a wild goose egg once or twice in a year, if I was lucky.

What if the perfect breakfast,

or any breakfast for that matter,

is just a fantasy for me?

Rules, recipes and decrees don't always work for everyone,

at least not in this world we live in.

And yet for those who can attain the rules, they tend to get galvanized.

It becomes all about following,

even achieving as many rules and rituals as a person can

while the very focus and purpose of those rules and rituals

fades further and further away.

Jesus spent a great deal of this ministry teaching in words and deeds

about this very thing.

Remember when some people wanted to kill Jesus

because he broke the Law of Moses

by healing a man on the Sabbath?

The parable of the Good Samaritan has two characters

who cared more about carrying out the proper rituals

at the proper times, in the proper manner,

than stopping to save a human life.

People trying to catch Jesus up in a technicality

was actually what he struggled with

for a good part of his ministry.

Doesn't it seem like they were missing the whole point?

Today happens to be Reformation Day,

the day we remember Martin Luther

who in 1517 agonized over things that were being done

in his own church

that did not match the Great Commandments.

He wrote out 95 debate topics

on the practice of purchasing tickets for salvation

and posted them on the front door of the church in Wittenburg.

For Martin Luther and the rest of the Reformers,

they were asking themselves,

Isn't our church missing the whole point of grace?

In time the Catholic Church has reformed,

and that need to reform is ongoing.

Oh, and lest we get to comfortable in our own Presbyterian pews.

Our own denomination has lots and lots of rules and regulations

and forms and agreements and ways.

These documents are readily available if you have a few years of your life to sit and read them all on the computer.

If we think there are a lot of ideas out there

about how to cook a perfect hard-boiled egg,

you should see how much is out there

on how to be a good Presbyterian.

And many of these ways and rules and forms are beneficial.

They are also constantly being reformed.

For example;

we had Cornerstone Ministries, right here in Niagara,

in Dunnville to be specific,

a unique type of grass roots ministry which tought

marginalized women and their young families

about faith and forgiveness,

about Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit,

about how to pray and why we pray

Each participant was taught that

any question is an important question.

And yet, up until seven years ago,

the Presbyterian Church in Canada had no template,

no agreement, no set system in place

to recognize or support a ministry whose congregational members

do not have any money to pay for their ministry.

I was there, in person, as our Church Offices struggled to figure out

Was this a mission field?

Was this a new church plant?

Was this a satellite of another church congregation -

who could afford to pay the price of a ministry like this?

When I challenged my contact at Church Offices

by saying;

'Wasn't a ministry to marginalized women and children,

which helps them to grow in faith and trust

the very point of church?'

He said, "Yes indeed, it was the point".

Then he said,

"Sometimes the Holy Spirit charges out in front of us

and we need a bit of time to catch up."

"Hear, O Israel:

The Lord our God, the Lord is one.

Love the Lord your God with all your heart

and with all your soul and with all your strength.

These commandments I give to you today

are to be on your hearts".

The Lord our God, the Lord is one.

The Lord our God is one with our created world, and with all humanity.

Can we even be in a right relationship with God

without loving our neighbour?

Today in our scriptures the "oneness" of God is being high-lighted.

The word "covenants", the plural of covenant,

does not exist in the First Testament,

because there is one covenant

and one covenant only, with God and God's people.

God, who is present in the world shaping history is not changing.

God is not random.

That means that God is not fickle

or unreliable or unpredictable.

God is always consistent with us and with the world.

There is for us, however, no quick and fast rules to being consistent.

Just because Jamie Oliver claims to know the rock solid recipe

to cook a hard-boiled egg to perfection absolutely every single time,

doesn't mean that his way is the right way for everyone.

Jesus' words sound simple and straight forward,

two commandments that most people would be hard pressed to disagree with.

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart

and with all your soul and with all your mind

and with all your strength.

Love your neighbour as yourself."

As soon as you agree to those two commandments,

the really hard work begins,

because there is no hard and fast, time tested,

straight forward recipe to live like that.

The world is changing

The society we live in is changing.

The climate is changing.

Our food is changing.

Our health care systems are changing.

What we learn about, and how we learn is changing.

If we cling too tightly to our old ways and our old rituals

we risk the real possibility that we are missing

the very point Jesus is reiterating in our scriptures today.

We need to go into our kitchens and look at our old pots

and our cold, refrigerated eggs

and ask ourselves if maybe there is a different way.

We need to ask ourselves who might not be able to eat eggs at all,

and how can we change that.

We need to challenge our subconscious biases

and that is truly hard work my friends,

always asking ourselves;

'What was Jesus' point?'

Love God in every way. Love neighbours as yourself.

"These commandments that I give you today

are to be on your hearts", said Moses.

Let's not let rituals and old patterns of doing things

take the place of love.

Instead as the Holy Spirit charges out before us,

let us commit to allowing change into our hearts

as we try in faith and trust, to catch up.
