Prayers of Approach and Confession

We come to worship from different places, O God. Some of us are carrying heavy burdens of stress and worry right now. Some of us feel the weight of loss: the loss of relationships, abilities, financial security, or the loss of someone dear to us. Some of us are carrying anger, resentment, or feelings of betrayal. Some of us, O God, feel consumed by envy—envy of others or frustration with circumstances we cannot control.

And yet, some of us, O God, are feeling good in this moment. We may feel successful, content, and satisfied. Perhaps we've come through an ordeal and find ourselves in a stable and peaceful place once more, feeling affirmed, loved, and grateful. Hear us now, O God, in the silence of our hearts, as we confess and share what is within us. (Pause)

You listen to us, O God. You celebrate with us, weep with us, and laugh with us. You see the beauty and possibility within us. You walk with us in our sadness, disappointment, hopelessness, and anger.

Lead us, O God. Lead us to the other side—to abundance, to peace, and to love. And now, we pray as Jesus taught us, saying together:

Sermon Faith in Times of Crisis

At the end of each liturgical year the Church asks us to consider the end of the world. Today's Bible readings are filled with ominous apocalyptic language about a coming cosmic collapse and signs of the end times. Terrible events are coming and everything is expected to fall apart! Trouble is to come. False teachers will seek to lead people astray. So, beware! There will be wars. There will be natural disasters. Even now, major world crises are prompting predictions that the end time has arrived. It is certainly true that there are challenges in our global community. Tension and conflict among nations and peoples is without doubt going on in many places. Advances in science and technology have made the threat that much greater. There are also the challenges of climate change and of vast gaps between rich and poor, the haves and the have nots. There is a growing fear of aging, or fear of the emergence of new and even more deadly viruses that might destroy whole segments of the population.

We have seen many changes even in our own lifetime. Things that once seemed so solid, such as job security, health, and even the church as a physical entity have all changed and are disappearing. As the Bible says, again and again, there is nothing permanent in the world. "Vanity of vanities, all is vanity."

Yet natural disasters, wars, and international conflicts are a part of the human condition. There will always be earthquakes, famines, wars, rumors of wars, and false prophets. Even in our own times, natural phenomena such as tsunamis, earthquakes, super-storms, and solar or lunar eclipses can and do prove very frightening.

Jesus does not answer the disciples' question about when the end will come directly. There have always been prophecies and predictions about when the world around us will be no more. Only God knows when the world will end.

Instead, Jesus instructs them on how to behave when such difficulties arise. Such events can also be the beginning of a new way to live together. So in response to their questions about the end

times, Jesus simply tells his followers to watch out for those who will claim to be the Christ and try to lead people astray. His response is clear. No matter what destruction or persecution or change may come, God is faithful to love us, for God's love for us never changes.

Today's first reading is from Daniel, the most apocalyptic book in the Hebrew bible. The book is set during the Babylonian exile, even though it was probably written long afterwards. Daniel sounds like he is issuing a threat when he talks about the time of the end: "But you people, the chosen of God, shall escape," he says. Michael, the great archangel, will come as your protector. By God's grace in God's love, whenever the end will come, God's people will be in God's hands.

Jesus offered a perfect sacrifice once and for all. There will be forgiveness at the end of human history. Whenever the end comes, God's grace in compassionate love will be there. Even though Daniel offers God's limited love to some people for eternal life, he offers hope, the hope of resurrection. Resurrection is the great gift of God's love for us, and is a part of our entire journey from birth, death, and the life beyond.

Today's gospel reading from Mark is also decidedly apocalyptic in nature. It was written after the destruction of the temple in 70 C. E., about forty years after Jesus' crucifixion. The Jews are in revolt against Rome. There are many fanatics and much social upheaval. Poverty, slavery, and taxes are gutting family incomes. Rome meets Jewish resistance with violence and lines the highways to Jerusalem with people nailed on crosses. The ancient Jews have lost their temple and their land. They are in despair, because they believe that when the temple is destroyed, the world will end. Paradoxically, they desire the end of the world, because this concept has always been a central idea in their faith, culture, and tradition.

Mark's community of Christians in Rome knew persecution under Nero, and Jewish people were also being persecuted. Jesus warns his disciples in order to fortify them with the assurance that he will be with them always.

How can we survive and thrive in the midst of all our own contemporary challenges? Jesus offers an alternative vision in today's gospel of John. Jesus' faithful disciples are called to be living witnesses to the peace Jesus offered to his disciples and gives us now. The way of witnessing to such peace is by keeping vigilant, awake to the way we invest our time, money, energy and learning. We are called to a commitment of living faith grounded in love. Such a commitment of living faith is also a commitment of hope. It is a commitment to the earth and to all of life. Such a commitment does not come without sacrifice.

Jesus teaches that trust in God and in God's vision for the world is the way forward for our world, regardless of whether the world accepts such a vision or not. We Christians must live out this vision, keep awake and vigilant, warning people, and representing an alternative. As followers of Christ, trusting in God's love, we are invited not to retaliate in our personal relationships, but to forgive. We are invited to spend our time and money for the sake of others and the earth because we care. We are invited to restrain our consumption and our appetites, learning to conserve, re-use and recycle, and to live lightly on this blue dot. Because we are growing in our capacity to love others, we witness to a faith, a trust in God and God's way, God's way of peace,

whether we live or die. We are bound by eternal principles, truth and right, justice and love that lives forever. We are ruled by and rooted in love and peace that extends beyond this world and goes deeper than just finding security for ourselves.

I admit that all of these things are learned through trial and error. True faith, grounded in love and commitment to others and to the earth, offers a vision of hope even if things are getting worse. It is like the hope of resurrection in the Book of Daniel, a peace that lives in us even if there is great unrest around us.

Even though the world might think this is a pathetically foolish way of surviving and thriving, we as followers of Jesus, full of God's love, should be able to witness that the inner strength to survive, to endure, and to thrive comes most to those who have learned through hard experience that trusting in love is the only spiritually authentic way to survive and thrive, whatever hardships, suffering and loss may be coming.

May we beware that no one leads us astray. May we live trusting God's never-changing love for us, living out God's love, and keeping the peace of Jesus alive inside us.
