### **Prayers of Approach and Confession**

How awesome it is to be here, O God,

breathing deeply, our hearts beating, our spirits reaching out to You. Quiet our busy minds, calm our restless bodies, and open our senses to Your presence among us. Awaken within us the spiritual awareness to discern Your will and feel Your love.

How awesome it is to be here in this moment,

listening for Your voice, seeking the truth of Your Kingdom and will, revealed to us through Jesus Christ, our Savior.

Eternal God, You call us to love: to love You, to love our neighbors, and to love ourselves. Jesus taught that true power lies in humble service and that Your reign is one of peace, compassion, and hope. We come to You today with all that we carry.

You know us completely, O God, and still, we choose to open ourselves to You, asking You to walk beside us and guide us on our journey. Hear us now in the silence as we lay our hearts before You...(pause)

Come and meet us, O God.

Meet us in our struggles: in illness, in strained relationships, in the uncertainty of our work, studies, health, or finances. Meet us in our fear and pain, and fill us with Your hope. Help us to trust in Your love, to rest in Your peace, and to follow You more faithfully. With open hearts and spirits, we now pray as Jesus taught us, saying:

"Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. ### SCRIPTURE PASSAGES

Responsive Psalm 132:1-12 The Gospel John 18: 33-37

Sermon "Thy Kingdom Come"

This Sunday is Reign of Christ Sunday, the last of this church year. What kind of picture does the word "King" in today's gospel text bring to mind for you today?

The context of the reading is that Pontius Pilate has been appointed governor of Judaea by the Roman Emperor Tiberius. As the representative of the Empire he rules as a bureaucrat to ensure satisfactory tax revenues are collected for Rome. Today's reading takes place during the Jewish Passover. To avoid unrest among the many people visiting Jerusalem for Passover, Pilate's garrison is on standby. Jesus, an itinerant preacher from Galilee, has been condemned and rejected by the Jewish religious court and handed over to Pilate on the trumped-up charge that he is claiming to be "king of the Jews." Pilate is worried about the political overtones of this charge. Is Jesus on a collision course of challenging Caesar's rule? The title on the cross over Jesus' head, King of the Jews (Jn 19:19), suggests Pilate has a real fear of an insurrection.

The narrative begins in verse 33 with Pilate, a politician, asking, Jesus, "Are you the king of the Jews?" Jesus' responds: "My kingdom is not from here" (v.36). Jesus refuses to affirm himself in political terms. This means Jesus is not a political king. Jesus is not a builder of Utopia; he is not one who will change this world into a perfect human society. He does not offer any certainty that this world will be peaceful, kind, and loving. His mission is to change human hearts, in order to establish a peaceful, just, and caring society that cares for the vulnerable, the sick, the lonely, and the forgotten. Injustice, violence, suffering, and dishonesty are to be the target of his followers' actions and efforts. To rid the whole world of poverty, prejudice, and hatred requires a caring and loving commitment to love God and all God's children.

What might a Utopia look like? It would do away with suffering and illness; it would stamp out violence and dishonesty; it would cure poverty and starvation; it would rid the world of prejudice and enmity; it would require all people to be caring and loving. Now when Jesus denies that he is a king of this world, I believe he means that none of these conditions are a direct function of his kingship. So we should not look for him to be an almighty, mythical, absolute monarch.

Jesus gives no orders, gathers no taxes, and shows no interest in getting to know the rich and influential. He invites allegiance and obedience. He dispels the popular notion that he will be a political leader who will free the Jews from Roman rule and oppression. Jesus' answer to Pilate thus shows that his kingdom is not political or social, it is instead spiritual and eternal. The love of God reigns in the kingdom of Jesus and Jesus clearly tells Pilate that, if his kingdom were a political one, his followers would be working to free him.

In verse 37, Pilate again says, "So, you are a king," Jesus agrees and answers, "I came into the world to testify to the truth." This answer redefines the words "messiah" and "king" to mean one who comes with a purpose from God to serve and give his life for others. Everyone who belongs to God listens to God's voice and does God's will in seeking justice and resisting evil.

In our human history, the world's kingdoms, or empires, which are based on violence and manipulation, have come and gone and there have been many of them. There has been the Greek Empire; the Roman Empire; and the French Empire; there have been Spanish, Soviet, British, and Aztec Empires; there have been Chinese and Korean Dynasties; and there have been Japanese, Ottoman, and Austro-Hungarian Empires.

The kingdom of Jesus, which is the reign of God in human hearts and minds, is rooted in God's love, in non-violence, forgiveness, healing, mutual respect, trust, and peace. This kingdom of love is eternal because God created and is creating us and others by grace. When every human kingdom has collapsed and human history is finished, Christ's kingdom will endure. As we journey on our pilgrim way, many voices compete for our allegiance. Whatever situations we find ourselves in, earthly authority does not have the last word for Christians. Our citizenship and allegiance challenge us to risk all for the sake of all others and to follow Jesus' attitudes and behaviours in this world. Jesus came, John reminds us, to give us all eternal life. To become a part of what Paul calls a new humanity is to struggle against the trials of living together in a broken, sinful world.

The kingdom of Christ is to be deeply rooted in our hearts, minds, and behaviours. We are called to build Christ's kingdom in love, by love, and for love, and to embody the word of God in an unbelieving world. This kingdom of Jesus is a place, a mind, and a heart where we love God with all our heart and with all our soul and with all our mind and with all our strength, and where we love our neighbours as ourselves. This kingdom of Jesus involves working for justice, loving the unloved, forgiving the sinful, and making peace with those who hate us. Jesus asks us to commit ourselves to this truth, to recognize his kingship over us and over the world God loves.

We all have human egos to protect and satisfy, and it is through these that we tend to identify ourselves and discover meaning and value in life. We tend to trust in the power of money, knowledge, fame, and recognition from others. We tend to praise the power of beauty, youth, pleasure, and the things that others don't have. Perhaps we fear what it means to truly follow such a King in the kingdom of love. Like Pilate, many keep the peace and protect themselves without doing what they know is God's will for them and others. It is never easy to follow Jesus' lifestyle and mission. We need to constantly encourage one another and together build a world that is more just, peaceful, and loving than it is today.

Jesus, our good shepherd, leads us beside still waters and prepares a banquet for us in the presence of our enemies even as we walk through the valley of death and the difficult times of our daily lives.

May you and I continue to pray, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven." Be assured that God continues to inspire, challenge, and guide us to put the truth in the Kingdom of Christ into practice in daily life so that the reign of God in love comes in family, church, community, and the whole world. Amen.
