SERMON The Gift of Spiritual Joy in Advent

I'll start with a joke. There was once a sincere Christian man out walking on a beach giving thanks for his joyful life. God said to him, "You have been so faithful that I'm going to grant you one special wish." The man was very excited and said: "I've always wanted to go to Hawaii, but I'm afraid to fly. So I would like you to build me a bridge so I can drive to Hawaii and have a joyful time there." God replied, "I am sorry, son. It's impossible to build a bridge across the ocean. Think of a more realistic request." After thinking a moment, the man said, "I wish I could understand women. I want to know how they feel inside, what they are thinking, why they cry, what they mean when they say, 'nothing!' and how to make them happy."

"Son," said God after a long pause, "Do you want two lanes or four on that bridge?"

At this time of getting ready for Christmas, many of us are excited and busy. Our days are filled with gift giving, Christmas music, greeting cards, church celebrations, special meals, Christmas trees, lights and decorations, nativity scenes, wreaths and garlands.

At the same time many feel lonely and this season brings not joy, but anxiety. Families quarrel and many people feel exhausted and find themselves deep in debt. There is a great deal of stress

connected to preparing for Christmas. Those who have lost loved ones, those who watch over the sick and dying, those who are unemployed, those who are stuck with hurts from the past, and those in family conflicts find little to celebrate. So how can we find and keep our joy no matter what is going on within us and around us?

Today is the third Sunday of preparing for Christmas. We have lit the Advent candle of joy and the lectionary readings have given us spiritual teachings about practical ways to be spiritually joyful, regardless of whatever happens in our physical and material lives.

Today's Old Testament reading is from the book of Zephaniah, a prophet who spoke when hard things needed to be said. The survival of a faithful remnant was at stake. In the midst of their difficulties the people shouted the Lord had removed judgment. In response Zephaniah told them" "The true king of Israel is in your midst. Your saviour will rejoice over you and renew God's love for you. God will sing because of you." Zephaniah reminds us that the Lord will renew us with God's love from the inside and there is no reason to be afraid. It is a magnificent promise of spiritual renewal and joy – whatever our age or the condition of our health. In the same spirit, the prophet Isaiah confesses and teaches us that spiritual joy comes from the belief that God loves us and protects us, and that it comes through giving thanks to God for God's faithful love.

Offering thanksgiving to God for the gift of life in our daily lives produces spiritual joy. Let us give thanks to God even though we keep our eyes tightly closed against the morning light as long as possible. Because there are people who are actually blind. Let us give thanks to God even though we put off the physical effort of rising. Because there are people who are actually bedfast. Let us give thanks to God even though our family morning is hectic, the toast is burned and tempers are short. Because there are people who are actually lonely. Let us give thanks to God even though our table never looks like the pictures in the magazines. Because there are people who are actually hungry.

With revolutionary faith, the apostle Paul encourages the Philippians, and us now, "to rejoice in the Lord always." It is important to remember that when he writes these words to the Philippians, he is not writing from a resort or from the beach. He is writing from prison. "In everything by prayer and supplication give thanks. Let your requests be made known to God and the peace of God, which passes all human understanding will keep your hearts and your minds focused on Christ Jesus."

Christian spiritual joy comes from God at work in us and in others. Very often we go looking for joy in material things and in far-away places. We go looking for emotional joy, which is fleeting and ephemeral. By contrast, spiritual joy is found with God and with others in ordinary things, in everyday happenings, and in ordinary people. We are led slowly and thoughtfully toward this great celebration of the incarnation, the mystery of God taking on flesh and being among us in the most ordinary of our ordinary days, the most overwhelming of our griefs, our most profound joys, and our deepest hopes. We may discover and experience the Word becoming flesh at every moment of our lives in our relationship with God through Jesus Christ. It is a truly spiritual joy if

we can find the God who is the Word made flesh that dwells among us. Spiritual joy already exists within our hearts. It is our job to discover and meet the God who is within us and others.

In today's gospel, three different groups of people—the crowds, the tax collectors, and the soldiers—ask John the Baptist what they must do for the coming of the Lord. To the crowds the Baptist says, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." To the tax collectors, John says: "collect no more than the amount prescribed." To the soldiers, John says, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages." John tells people to change their behaviour. He does not recommend pious practices for others to see.

Today's scripture readings remind us spiritual joy is not a temporal or perishable pleasure. Joy as one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit is a distinctly spiritual matter. It has its springs deep down inside. And that spring never runs dry, no matter what happens. The apostle Paul says that the joy comes from our intimate relationship with God. The prophets Zephaniah and Isaiah teach us that joy can be found when we offer thanksgiving to God for the gift of life, for God's constant loving presence, and for God's many blessings for our daily life. Moreover, John the Baptist advises us that the greatest joy is love.

During this Advent season of preparation, we are to return to the well of God's grace and wait for the spiritual gift of joy God gives. May the light of the Advent candle show us that joy is not necessarily the absence of suffering, pain, stress, and loneliness, but is the loving presence of God.

May we know the joys of being alive in intimate relationship with God and doing good, of caring for others in need, of loving and being loved. May we know the truth of our mutual human journey by learning how to enjoy a little and to endure very much for the sake of the spiritual joy in which we are intended to live. Amen.

Make us capable of listening, learning, and applying ourselves to the plight of others.

In this holy season, we lift to You all who are lost or displaced—those suffering from injustice, war, or natural disasters, and those searching for safety and shelter. We think of those in Canada struggling with the high cost of living, left without a place to belong as the cold sets in. Stir our hearts to act with compassion, to advocate for change, and to share what we have so all may find refuge and care.

We pray for those burdened by mental health struggles, addiction, or grief. Comfort them with Your love and surround them with peace and healing. May Your hope and joy shine through us as we share Christ's light in a hurting world. Transform us, O God, to be instruments of Your grace.

As we go forth, we lift to You those among us in our church family who are unwell, weary, or burdened by sorrow. In this season of waiting, remind them of Your presence and fill their hearts with the deep, unshakable joy that comes from You alone.
