PRAYERS OF APPROACH, CONFESSION and The Lord's Prayer

Inner peace, inner stillness, inner rest—O God, how many of us long for this? A clear purpose, a path ahead, the lifting of confusion and distress—O God, how many of us seek this? Genuine relationships, the chance to give love, to be appreciated and loved in return, to be heard, respected, and valued—O God, how many of us yearn for this?

Hear us now, in the silence, as we lay our hearts before You. (pause)

You know our fears, even those we cannot name. You know what weighs us down, what keeps us restless. You know the thoughts that send us running in all directions.

Yet in the midst of it all, You speak—even now. "I am with you. I am in you. I am trying to take root in you." Will we open up and let You in? Will we release what needs to go? Will we place everything before You and trust You completely?

O God, we commit ourselves to this, even when it is hard. Begin Your work in us—or begin it again. Transform us, slowly but surely, until something new is born again. And now, we pray as Jesus taught us, saying

SCRIPTURE PASSAGES

Responsive Psalm 121 1 John 4: 15-18; Romans 13: 8-10; John 3: 1-17

SERMON The Love that casts out Fear

What is fear? What are we now afraid of? We have many fears: fear of mistakes, failure, rejection, betrayal, losing control, car accidents, incurable illness, etc. The list of fears can be endless. In particular, I think we are all worried about jobs in industries like cars and energy, problems with the U.S., and how this affects our country. The trade issues are causing stress and making many people feel unsure and upset.

Fear is like an iceberg. Sometimes our fears are hidden behind our concern for better security and protection in our lives. Political philosopher of the early modern world, John Locke, described human beings as driven by a fear of death and an instinct for self-protection. That is why we are motivated to work together as people in order to maximize our security and protection. Security can come in many forms: material, social and spiritual. We want to have enough money in the bank and safety in our homes and communities. We want to know that we will not die alone and that we will be safe after we die.

But even if we are sufficiently healthy, secure in our lifestyle choices, comfortable, and relatively free of fear, there is another challenge: It is a feeling of emptiness we experience in our hearts, along with a sense of life's meaninglessness. Money can only go so far to fulfill us. Our work or profession can only go so far. Getting involved in social activities and getting involved with children, family, and friends is also very fulfilling, but it cannot provide us with what we need to solve the feeling of emptiness.

Today's gospel reading gives us some guidance and an answer to these feelings of fear and emptiness. The gospel points to the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God and the Spirit of Jesus. The Holy Spirit is an energy that produces dynamic power and transforms the way we feel, the way we think, and the way we choose to live.

The gospel tells us of the reality of fear: the fear of Nicodemus and the religious groups of the Pharisees. In the story, Nicodemus comes to see Jesus at night. He is afraid to visit Jesus in broad daylight, so he makes a nighttime visit. Nicodemus is a man driven by fear. He is one of an elite religious group of Pharisees in Jewish society, a group with clear views about morals and society.

They don't like Jesus because Jesus speaks with an authority that threatens them. He is motivated not by fear but by love. He is far too accepting of people with moral flaws, even those who are moral failures.

Jesus talks to Nicodemus about the movement of the Holy Spirit. When we have some connection in the Holy Spirit, or when we are caught up in the Holy Spirit, fear is weakened and disappears. Without any doubt, fear is a part of all of our lives, and is a healthy component in making us aware of danger, in making us mindful of many things. But fear is an unhealthy hindrance, a block, for the deepest transformations in our lives, for the richest flowering of love in our lives, for the greatest purposes in our lives. Fear may have its place, but it should not be our primary motivator. Fear should not be at the center of our being.

How then can we overcome unhealthy fear? In today's gospel reading, Jesus talks about the Holy Spirit as God's invisible presence. And the greatest sign that the Spirit is working is when love wells up inside us. We visit someone in the hospital or in their home. This might be someone whom we have often found a challenge to see. We may have problems with their character, their negative attitude, and their choices in life. But then we have this experience of something rising within us. We make a connection during our visit. This person shares with us some intimate details of their lives. They speak with wisdom. We see their courage and strength. We feel warm toward them, and we feel love. *This* is the movement of the Spirit of God. In the gospels, Jesus frequently asks his followers to pray for the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the gift of love.

The first letter of John puts forth the basic tenet that "Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love...and there is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear." We experience our fears falling away when we experience a personal transformation in our lives that is grounded in and motivated by love. We begin to trust, and love begins to grow, setting even deeper roots within us. We discover a new peace, a more durable peace. We open up to people with whom we might otherwise be closed. We are less prone to judge, more prone to see the good in them. We see beauty in the world around us, despite all the degradation of our planet, the bad attitudes in society, the cruelties and the tragedies. Despite all this, we see and experience beauty, goodness, gratitude, and awe.

What does it mean to believe in Jesus? This is what Jesus has in his mind when he speaks about "being born again" to Nicodemus in the story: To believe in Jesus is to receive his Spirit, the Holy Spirit. It is an experience. For some of us, it doesn't happen all at once. Usually, dramatic conversations happen for those who have major crises; however, for most of us, life happens in stages, with some advances and some setbacks. And so the kind of personal transformation we need is the kind that makes us better able to deal with the situations in our lives, the relationships in our lives, the challenges that stretch our limits and our patience.

The Holy Spirit is God's invisible movement and energy, living in and through Jesus, granted to all of us who call on God and recognize God in Jesus. In verse 16, we are told: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." And verse 17 clearly tells and teaches us God's love, saying: "For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved

through him." The authentic love of God transforms us. It overcomes those places of fear, those places of insecurity in our lives, those places of emptiness, where we feel life is missing something fundamental.

As imperfect, limited, and vulnerable beings, we all experience fear in each stage of our lives. We look for some security and protection in our lives. We experience times when we feel emptiness. However, as Christians, our primary resource is reaching out to God in prayer and faith. We are looking for ever new levels of change and renewal in our lives, of being born again and again from above. As we face new fears and worries, we pray for God's peace. As we recognize new spaces of emptiness and insecurity within us, we pray for love to give us a purpose and a trust so that we don't have to be afraid of what is and what will be.

May the Holy Spirit come to us and within us, filling us with God's love that heals, nourishes, and transforms. May we feel Your presence in every moment of fear, every space of emptiness, and every challenge we face. Let Your love cast out our fears, renew our hearts, and guide us to live with courage, trust, and joy. May we see Your beauty in the world and in one another, and may we be vessels of Your peace and love. Amen.

Finally, we take a moment in silence to name before You the concerns, situations, and people who need Your healing love today. (pause)

For healing, we pray, O God, in all its forms—healing of body, mind, spirit, and relationships. May Your presence bring peace, comfort, and new life to those who seek You. And so, we pray for blessing: For faith that is resilient, For hope that is steadfast, and for love—a love that fills us, transforms us, and sends us out into the world with courage and joy. We pray this boldly in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior and our strength. Amen.
