## **SERMON** What we learned after Easter

Long before I became an ordained minister, at the beginning of my working lifeI was an elementary school teacher -teaching little children how to read, and to write, and make sense of the world. There are three main types of learning styles, and each one of us has a dominate style. Visual learners learn and remember best what they can see, auditory learners rely mostly on what they hear for learning and tactile learners make connections by what they can feel, learning predominantly through their sense of touch.

This might be news to you this morning or you may very well know which way you, yourself learn best. For instance, I am a strong visual learner and a rather weak auditory learner, so if someone gives me directions by saying,

"You just go straight down this road, and turn left at the stop sign, then hang a right and it's on your right....."

Oh boy! All I can remember is to go down the road!

But draw me a map, and let me see it with my own eyes

and then I'll be able to get where I am going!

So you can imagine then how my heart was burning inside me one morning -

early, early, on my very first day in the city of Dublin, Ireland. Our plane had landed at 5 o'clock am in the morning. Our hotel room would be ready at 1 o'clock pm. Somehow my husband, Trevor and I had to fill in time in this brand-new city which happened to be very cold, that September morning.

At 9:00am The National Gallery of Ireland opened, and admission was free. We walked through hall after hall of incredible paintings by renowned artists, and classical artists and some modern artists, until quite by mistake we wandered into the room of Christian Art.

Now at this point my husband was so tired he sat on a bench, and I am pretty sure he was sleeping with is eyes wide open, ..... but not me.

For me it was like stepping right into the Bible, visually able to drink in story after story which I had almost exclusively read or heard, but not ever seen in living colour.

The canvasses were floor to ceiling, the familiar people depicted in them were as large sometimes larger, than I was.

- -the chaos and confusion of the feeding of the five thousand,
- -the prodigal son, with eyes only for the money bags and no one else,
- -and The Supper at Emmaus by Jacob Jordaens.

I bought a postcard of that one in the gift store before heading to our hotel.

We read, "As they walked... Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; but they were kept from recognizing him." This is what I could see in that painting:

Three men are seated around a square table, already laden with bowls of food.

The sommelier, a big official looking man with a towel thrown over his shoulder is dramatically pouring wine from a silver decanter into an ornate cup.

The waitress is young and plump with rosy cheeks from the effort of serving their guests.

Her hair is bound in a light cap and she holds a platter of food aloft as she approaches the table.

You can tell this isn't one of those slow nights in the restaurant either- the room contains passion and animation and energy.

There are animals in the picture too, a bird perched outside the open door, a dog under the table and a small cat under the chair that Jesus sits on.

These animals look less like cuddly pets and more like they are hungry, preoccupied with catching and eating any morsel that might fall from that table.

The three men are seated.

One of them is Cleopas in a golden tunic, the other, his companion. Neither man is one of Jesus' disciples, but part of a larger group called the multitude. Both men are leaning in toward Jesus, intently concentrating on his face, their arms are outstretched and hands gesturing, like they are trying to tell him something very important.

And Jesus sits at the head of the table, clothed in blue robes, with feet bare.

He is glancing up and past them- like he sees something beyond that none of the rest of them are seeing.

In his left hand, he holds a small loaf, and he has just torn the top off of it...

That's the moment Jacob Jordaens freezes and captures The Supper at Emmaus.

I've looked and looked at this picture and hard as I try, I cannot spot any remnant of blood or scar

on Jesus' hands and feet. His hands tearing open the loaf are placed just so, his right foot behind the leg of the table, I myself can't see for the life of me

the marks that would be the dead give away of who Jesus really is.

The people in the picture aren't looking there and there, (indicate middle of each palm) they don't know to look of course -

But we have heard the Easter story before and so has the artist and yet the fresh wounds are not ours to see.

Cleopas and his companion had been despondent out on the road when they explained,

"The chief priests and the rulers handed [Jesus] over to be sentenced to death and they crucified him, but we had hoped he would be the one to redeem Israel."

The people hadn't done this, according to Luke. It was the powers of the world, the power systems that dominate the world - Those in control, who stand in opposition to God and God's kingdom come. This was not what they had expected either.

They use the word to redeem, which means to free a person or nation, to buy them back out of bondage, to tear the hard-pressed thumb of oppression off them. And this is when Jesus calls them 'foolish' and 'slow to see'. Had it not been told once, twice and three times, in detail what had to happen?

We heard it too, you and I.

And it says, "he explained again what was said in all the scriptures concerning himself." I bet they nodded their heads 'yes' as he spoke but really, they still did not catch more than the first thing he said. Then, they invited him in to stay for dinner, they extended hospitality to him although they did not know who he was. And it was at the table, with the hungry animals hoping for crumbs to fall, and the serving staff anxious to please, and the animated conversation swirling, that they saw him breaking the bread. and they remembered...

It was like Jesus was showing them - you have seen me doing this before, on the hill with 5000 hungry people, in the upper room and in that sensory visual moment they remembered and connected what they had heard on the road.

Scripture by itself didn't do it... Oh boy, but when the connection was made, a spark was struck, and their hearts were burning in their chests. We read: "When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks and began to give it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight." That last part is harder to understand. Why did Jesus have to vanish just at the moment of realization? This is what we learn after Easter.

Jesus Christ can not be pinned down. As much as they wanted to, they could not hold onto him. As much as we may want to we cannot examine him closely to satisfy our curiosity or doubt. We get glimpses through the Holy Spirit, but this gift is not to be held down or grasped - knowing fully is always just beyond each one of us.

Here is what did happen; Cleopas and his companion "got up and returned at once to Jerusalem." It was already evening, and the sun was setting.

They had urged Jesus to stay with them, to have dinner because it was not safe to be out on the roads after dark.

But this, this was too important, and they took the risk and hurried back to the city, pulled back in to community. There is no doubt in their minds now, they know what they know.

It says, "There they found the eleven and those with them, assembled together and saying, "It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon. "Then the two told what had happened on the way, and how Jesus was recognized by them

when he broke the bread." We are never introduced to Simon

but it is possible they met him on their way back and he too had an encounter with the risen Lord

which he shared with them. So now they are pushed back together, back together as a community: The women had shared their part of the story;-they told that they had seen a vision of angels, who said he was alive.- Some of the others had run back to the tomb and found it as the women said but did not see Jesus.- Simon had an experience all of his own- And now Cleopas and his companion where there breathlessly telling what they saw too.

They are back in community remembering together, each with a slightly different part to share, each with a different piece of the puzzle. Notice how it is through hospitality, inviting someone other in to share their unique and nuanced experiences that makes understanding possible. This opportunity to listen to truths from others is a gift.

On our own, we catch glimpses but a community of sharing becomes a community of a wide variety of experiences and knowing. The messages of the scriptures are very important but they can seem abstract, until through the act of sitting down together, sharing our own experiences of the Holy Spirit with each other- they become personal.

We can't hold onto Jesus but we have been given the gift of community. It's like a puzzle, and each one of us holds a piece. It's only when we put our pieces together, fit them in alongside each other that a bigger, clearer picture starts to emerge.

This congregation, these two-sister congregations have gathered together in community for many years -to share your own experiences and knowledge, your truth, your trust and your doubts, your challenges and your joys as a people of faith following the way of Jesus Christ. May you continue to see the importance of practicing hospitality.

And the importance of listening to each other through the Holy Spirit. And may your hospitality be a blessing to each other and to those whom God will introduce to you in the future. Amen
