SCRIPTURE PASSAGES Responsive Psalm 81

Isaiah 40 : 27-31, Romans 5 : 1-11

SERMON I am not okay ... or am I?

I am not okay
I'm barely gettin' by
I'm losin' track of days
And losin' sleep at night

I am not okay
I'm hangin' on the rails
So if I say I am fine
Just know I've learned to hide it well

These are lyrics from a song by country music artist, Jelly Roll and as words they are powerful and paint a picture of someone who is clearly suffering and experiencing some dark, struggling days.

For those not familiar with Jelly Roll, which likely many of you aren't, Jelly Roll displays what some might say a harsh exterior, displaying many tattoos on his face creating a very ominous presence. But, when you actually hear the story behind this rough looking exterior, you quickly

realize this man has a story to tell. Born Jason DeFord, he had a tumultuous life. Not one to be a stranger to the legal system, he was incarcerated many times over a 10 year period for drug related offences, and aggravated robbery. He readily admits, "I was not a nice person, and I deeply regret the harm I caused people" About a year ago, Jelly Roll returned to his Christian faith, expressing," I have a heart for God, and I have a heart for Jesus". Now, with a successful music career, Jelly Roll is sharing his experiences with mental health and troubles with the law through his music hoping to help others struggling.

Now, my family thought I was nuts to even think about working Jelly Roll into this message, but I am intrigued by who he is, where he's been and the message his song imparts. And it doesn't really matter if you've heard of him or not, he is simply a representation of someone who isn't ashamed to express that he is not okay. The power of music and the power of lyrics can make change happen, make you think and reflect on your own journeys.

I think it's fair to say, that all of us here can say those words, "I am not okay". While the song specifically addresses Jelly Rolls own experiences with mental illness, I am not okay can relate to so many aspects of our life's experiences - loneliness, aging, financial concerns, family worries, health worries, employment challenges and on and on. Life is hard, this we all know. But this is what we've got folks! Have you ever heard the expression, Life is Messy? For some, that's an understatement.

I know I can't be the only one Who's holdin' on for dear life But God knows, I know When it's all said and done

I'm not okay
But it's all gonna be all right
It's not okay
But we're all gonna be all right

That line resonates with me - We're all gonna be all right!

While the song centers around feeling "not okay," there's also an underlying theme of hope. In the darkest moments, it may feel as though healing is impossible, but Jelly Roll's message suggests that healing is not only possible, but it's within reach.

I believe this to be the case.

But before I go any farther, I want to say that this message is not to minimize or trivialize others situations. I recognize that mental illness is very real and very serious and a battle many face. I

also acknowledge that people's struggles are very personal so for me to suggest that I have all the answers would be very false and very presumptuous of me.

The purpose of my message is to offer some hope - and that's what I feel about the chorus of this song. The chorus acts as a beacon of hope amidst the turmoil, emphasizing that while the narrator may not be okay at the moment, there is a belief that everything will eventually be alright. The lyric "I'm not OK, but it's all gonna be alright" serves as a mantra for resilience and faith in a better future.

I know one day
We'll see the other side
The pain'll wash away
In a holy water tide
And we all gonna be alright

These words provide a sense of solace, suggesting that someday the pain will fade away, bringing a sense of renewal and healing. Overall, "I Am Not OK" is a raw and honest portrayal of the struggles with mental health, the importance of acknowledging one's true feelings, and the enduring belief in better days ahead despite the current challenges.

From our scripture today:

Psalm 81:6 & 7 states, "I removed the burden from their shoulders; their hands were set free from the basket. In your distress you called, and I rescued you" This verse emphasizes God's promise to deliver His people from their troubles and burdens, symbolizing freedom from oppression and hardship. It reflects the theme of divine care and deliverance, reminding believers of God's ability to lift their burdens and provide relief in times of distress.

Our faith is such a gift! "In your distress you called" Ask God for help, take it to God in prayer, include him in your struggles because he gives us hope.

The heading in our Bibles for Romans 5 says Peace and Joy which in of itself I find reassuring and comforting. Verses 1 and 2 states, "Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we rejoice in the hope of the glory of God".

When we have faith in Jesus, we are granted reconciliation with God. This means that all barriers and separation caused by sin are removed, and we can have a harmonious and intimate relationship with God. This peace with God brings a sense of wholeness, security, and assurance that we are accepted and loved by our Creator. It is a profound peace that surpasses understanding and fills our hearts with joy and gratitude.

Furthermore, in Jesus, we find hope in the boundless love of God. This love is unconditional, sacrificial, and everlasting. It is a love that transcends human comprehension and offers us a sense of purpose, belonging, and significance. We can rest in the assurance that God cherishes and values us, and His love will guide, protect, and sustain us through all circumstances when we trust in Jesus. This verse reminds us of the transformative power of faith in Jesus, leading us to experience the deep peace and abiding hope that come from being reconciled to God and enveloped in His endless love.

Continuing with our passage from Isaiah

Verse 29 says, He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak, and verse 31, but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength.

In this powerful passage from Isaiah, we hear a message of hope and strength deeply embedded within the verses. The scripture begins by addressing God's chosen people, Israel, who feel lost or overlooked. They express sentiments of being unseen and unheard by their God. This situation often resonates with us when we face difficult times in life, feeling that our struggles are invisible to God. Yet, the text assures us that the Lord is entirely aware of our circumstances and that His understanding transcends human comprehension. It's baffling to us sometimes, how God can care for us so much and so deeply, but this is also our assurance that we can turn to God with whatever our struggles are.

Isaiah emphasizes that even the strongest and most youthful among us can become weary and fall short. In a world that often idolizes strength, fitness, and performance, this reminder is refreshing. We can confidently acknowledge our limits, knowing that God does not expect us to be invincible. Rather, through Him, we can find the endurance needed to keep moving forward even when life challenges us.

I woke up today
I almost stayed in bed
Had the devil on my back
And voices in my head

Some days it ain't all bad Some days it all gets worse Some days I swear I'm better off Layin' in that dirt This acknowledgment of pain and cautious hope makes Jelly Roll's song stand out, but I also think it is something we can all relate to. And through this connection, we find comfort in knowing we are not alone.

I believe it is all going to be all right - I have to believe that we all have to believe that, because being all right is the only option. God needs us to be all right so his work can continue to be done in whatever way we can. It's crucially important.

Baptized at 14, and then led astray by life, upon Jelly Roll's return to religion and the church, he states, "I was reminded of the genuineness that can be in those walls, too. I was reminded of the humanity and the compassion and the forgiveness, the love and the community, more than anything"

This past week something happened in Minneapolis, a gunman opened fire on Annunciation Catholic Church while children from Annunciation Catholic School were gathered for the opening of the school year mass. Two children were killed and during one of the news reports, a spokesperson, I'm not sure if it was for the police or a school official, commented "There is no hope here, these kids were in church praying when this happened" And that line struck me"There is no hope here" and while in the face of tragedy and darkness the immediate thought might be that there is no hope, I believe hope is still present. Darkness in the world exists always has and always will, but it is because we have this trustworthy hope in God that we can come together, we can heal, and we can move forward. Hope propels us forward, equips us with the gift of having our faith and God in our lives. Hope turns darkness to light and provides strength of understanding. Hope in the Lord is like the ball always coming back down after it has been tossed up - it's guaranteed! God gave his Son, so we might have this gift of hope. It is a hope that transforms lives, providing comfort, motivation, and a future expectation of glory with God. It inspires renewal and restoration in believers' lives promoting change and healing. My hope, our hope is built on nothing less, than Jesus' blood and righteousness!

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead," 1 Peter 1:3.

So, let us not forget that we can support each other - we are a family of God - through which he can work to help us make each other's struggles more bearable.

And as summer ends and we start a new month this week, let us return to church with renewed energy and hope for our future, our friends and our faith, because honestly, when it's all said and done, God knows, it's all gonna be alright!
