Call to Worship

L: "Lord, you have searched me and you know me." (Psalm 139:1)

P: We come to open our hearts before God, to be fully known and deeply embraced.

L: We come as people who are imperfect and flawed, yet gifted and blessed.

P: We come to discover how beautiful and wondrous we are as God's creations— with all our strengths and all our limitations.

All: Here, may God find us, and may we find God, in the fullness of our humanity.

PRAYERS OF APPROACH, CONFESSION and The Lord's Prayer

We come, O God, drawn by your Spirit, seeking to know ourselves as you know us. You search us and you see us—our gifts and our weaknesses, our hopes and our fears. And still, you call us your beloved.

Yet we confess, O God, that we often see ourselves through the world's eyes. We measure our worth by success or failure, by what we own, or by how others see us. We compare ourselves, longing to be more than we are, forgetting that you made us as your wondrous creation.

We confess too that, like Philemon, we sometimes see others through labels—important or unimportant, strong or weak, one of us or not one of us. Forgive us when we fail to see others as brothers and sisters in Christ. Hear us now, O God, as in silence we bring before you our struggles, our failures, and our longing to be renewed. (Silent prayer)

You know us completely, O God. You see our flaws, and yet you love us. You embrace our limits, and yet you trust us. In Jesus Christ, we are forgiven, set free to live not by the world's judgment, but by your vision of love and grace. Thanks be to God!

We pray in the name of Jesus, and together we pray as he taught us, saying:

THE LORD'S PRAYER

"Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. SCRIPTURE PASSAGES Responsive Psalm 139: 1-18

Philemon 1-21

SERMON God's Vision of Who We Are

We humans identify ourselves and are often identified by external and surface conditions. We live in a world where we are often judged and measured by the neighborhood we live in, how much money we have, our education, job, attractiveness, body size, reputation, or popularity. Even in the matter of faith, believers tend to identify how faithful they are according to the church they attend in comparison with other churches. Where a person fits in makes all the difference to their sense of worth and value, because a person's value and worth tend to be measured by the world around us. This is our world, just as it was the world of the people in the Bible.

Today's scripture readings are all about who we are, especially in relation to God. Psalm 139 is both frightening and transforming for those of us who have trouble accepting ourselves and loving ourselves as we are, with all our imperfections and inadequacies. "You have searched me, Lord, and you know me. You know when I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar. You discern my going out and my lying down; you are familiar with all my ways." (vv. 1-3) The psalmist tells us that God knows us inside and out. This is frightening for anyone who wants to forget certain things about themselves, for anyone who wants to forget the pain inside, the shame or guilt or hate, or whatever. Imagine being so well known that there are no secrets and nowhere to hide, no way to pretend something isn't there when it is. The psalmist is frightened because he is afraid of what God will see if God can see everything. He seems to be afraid God is going to be disappointed that he just doesn't quite measure up to all that God dreams he will become.

At the same time, however, the psalmist feels assurance, comfort, and peace. This is because he feels completely known, entirely loved, fully embraced. He believes that God knows him best and thinks he is the most unique, precious, and wonderous gift. Imagine God knowing us so profoundly that there is nothing we can hide from God, even those feelings or memories for which we have no words. God knows them all inside us. Whatever thoughts, feelings, and memories are inside us, God still loves, embraces, and believes in us. The God who exists inside us wants us to be all that we can be, because God loves us infinitely and eternally already.

The change that comes in each of us, comes when we begin not only to see ourselves but also to believe in ourselves as God sees and believes in us. Inner change and growth come when we see ourselves as God sees us. It can come when we begin to love ourselves as God loves us. If we see ourselves as inadequate or flawed in such a way that we are stuck or overwhelmed, then we cannot change or flourish in any way. Amazing things can happen if we see ourselves beyond the judgements of others such that we envision the beauty, potential, and possibility in ourselves.

The psalmist inspires each of us to be a human being before God as we are, with strengths and beauty as well as weaknesses, limitations, and flaws, because God creates us as imperfect beings and loves us as we are, infinitely and eternally. In order to experience God's steadfast and compassionate love for us, we need a relationship with God that is personal. We need to believe in God enough to believe that God really knows us and loves us as we are inside and out.

Of course, God cannot enjoy those things we do that are selfish, hurtful, or narrow-minded because they come from dark places inside us. We human beings have a dark side and depending on the pressures and strains of life at any given time, that dark side can really take over. However, the darkness that is a part of life can be overcome with the help of God. If we discover and develop a relationship with God where we begin to believe this, it will lead to transformative change in our lives. Through this inner change, we can become more and more what God sees in us. That is God's vision and will. And that is what this psalmist has seen.

Paul's letter to Philemon is also a remarkable example of understanding oneself and living accordingly. The letter is addressed not to a church but to one person. To discover the message of the letter, we need to understand the context of the first century world. This is a world, like our own world, where there is vast social inequality. The world the apostle Paul lives in has slaves and free persons, those who are Romans or from the right culture, and those who are from races and cultures less noble or valued. Some belong to the right family and circle while others belong to the wrong one.

Philemon is a wealthy Christian who has a church in his house and ensures that there is a place for worship and fellowship. Like most rich people in that world, Philemon also has slaves. One of those slaves is called Onesimus. Onesimus has escaped and has found his way into the church and the company of the apostle Paul. Onesimus has become attached to Paul and is his physical and social attendant because Paul has permanent health problems from his years in prison.

The purpose of this letter is to request Philemon to let go his claims on Onesimus. Paul is asking him not only to forgive his slave but also to give him his freedom. The main reason Paul gives is that Onesimus is Christian and he and Philemon are brothers in Christ. They are both now servants of Christ. In other words, they are mutual servants to each other. Paul wants Philemon to make this decision to give Onesimus his freedom, freely and in love.

Beneath the surface this letter tells us we can be free of a human culture where we need to feel we are better than others in order to feel our worth and value. Let us remember that we are all precious to God, even though we have different gifts and talents. Each of us is important and beloved, even though some of us are more successful than others in the world. This spiritual truth

gives us the freedom to live out all our gifts, talents, and successes, but also to embrace who we are with all our limitations and failings. God has imparted God's life to us all. God loves us boundlessly and eternally as we are. How we do in this world and where we fit socially makes no difference to God. And it should make no difference to how we see ourselves also.

May we discover and experience our real selves as human beings, not on the surface, but as God sees us in our inner lives and hearts. We are all unique and different. We are all on a journey of discovery to find who we are.

May we connect with God and see ourselves through God's eyes and heart, that we may encounter and enjoy the beauty and abundance within us, just as God does. Amen.

weary, and forgotten, make your presence known in compassion and care. Where leaders grasp for power instead of serving, turn hearts toward wisdom, humility, and service.

Help us, O God, not to be passive in the face of suffering, but to take our place as your beloved children—instruments of your peace, bearers of your vision, living signs of your steadfast love.

We pray for those more personally who are facing major transitions in their health needs, both physical and mental, for those burdened by grief or uncertainty; for those who feel lonely, unseen, or unloved. Surround them with your presence, and give them strength, comfort, and peace.

We pray also for the quiet joys and small victories in our lives—for moments of laughter, for gifts of friendship, for family and for this church community.
