### **SERMON**

### **Preparing the Way of Peace**

Today we gather in this sacred season of Advent, a time when we open our hearts to the coming of Christ—our Light, our Hope, and today, especially, our Peace. On this White Gift Sunday, we also remember that God's peace is never meant to be kept for ourselves alone. It is meant to be shared generously, compassionately, and joyfully with others.

For us as Christians, Christmas is never just a holiday on the calendar. It is not simply a time for gatherings, decorations, and gifts. Christmas is the celebration of new birth—the birth of hope, new life, new purpose, and transformation. Christ comes into the world not as an idea, but as a child, reminding us that God chooses the most tender and humble way to reach us.

Yet we also know that not everyone feels excitement as Christmas approaches. Many among us carry quiet burdens. Some are grieving the loss of loved ones, and those losses can feel sharper in December. Some live with illness, or care for someone who is struggling. Others face anxiety about finances, family tensions, or loneliness. For many seniors, this season brings back deep memories—some joyful, some painful. We hold all of this honestly before God today.

So how do we prepare for Christmas in a year when our hearts might feel tired or heavy? How do we welcome the peace of Christ when our spirits feel unsettled?

Our Scriptures today offer a gentle answer. "Comfort, O comfort my people," says your God. These words from Isaiah were spoken to people who had endured a long period of hardship, uncertainty, and exile. They had lost much. They wondered where God was and whether their future still held promise. Into that pain, God spoke a word of comfort strong enough to hold them: "I am coming to you. I will lead you home. I will give you peace."

This is the same promise we hear today. God's peace does not ask us to deny our struggles or pretend that all is well. Instead, God's peace meets us right where we are. It settles into the places where we are anxious, wounded, or weary, and whispers gently: "You are not alone. I am with you. You are held."

Peace in the Bible is not simply the absence of conflict. It is shalom—a deep, steady, life-giving wholeness that comes from God. It is the peace that keeps our hearts steady even when life is uncertain. It is a peace that comforts us when we grieve, strengthens us when we are weak, and guides us when we do not know what comes next.

In Mark's Gospel, the story begins not with angels or shepherds, but with John the Baptist—the voice calling out in the wilderness, "Prepare the way of the Lord." John calls us to prepare our hearts for the One who brings peace. And the way we prepare is through repentance—turning our lives toward God so that God's peace can enter and renew us.

Repentance simply means making room. Making room for healing. Making room for new beginnings. Making room for the peace we long for but cannot create on our own. John's message is not harsh; it is hopeful. He knows that when we hold on tightly to old hurts, regrets, resentments, or guilt, our hearts become crowded and restless. But when we let those things go—when we forgive others, and when we forgive ourselves—new space opens within us for God to breathe peace into our lives.

Forgiveness is one of the deepest gifts of Christmas. It is not always easy, especially as the years go by and memories settle deep. Many seniors carry long histories—some beautiful, some difficult. There may be things we wish we had done differently, words we regret, or wounds we still carry.

Forgiveness does not mean that the past did not matter; it means that the past no longer has the power to steal our peace. To forgive is to say: "I will not let this hurt shape my heart anymore." "I will not let bitterness guide my steps." "I will walk forward with God in peace."

When we forgive others, we loosen the grip of old pain. When we forgive ourselves, we loosen the grip of shame. And when those burdens fall away, God's peace has room to grow.

Seniors understand deeply that life is too short to carry resentment. There comes a time when we need gentleness with ourselves and with others—a time when peace is more precious than being right, and love is more important than winning an argument.

The Messiah comes offering this peace freely. Our task is simply to receive it. Unforgiven wounds—whether our own or others'—tie our hearts in knots. They keep us focused on the past and make it difficult to live fully in the present. But forgiveness, like peace, is freedom.

Forgiveness is like a door opening to a warm, bright room. It allows God's love to enter the places we keep hidden. It allows our spirits to breathe again. And it reminds us that we are God's beloved children, known completely and loved completely.

The child in the manger comes not only with tenderness but with strength—the strength to break the chains of fear, guilt, and regret. He comes offering peace deeper than the circumstances around us. A peace that no illness, no loss, no hardship can take away. A peace that stays with us even as our bodies age and our lives change. This is the peace we seek in Advent. This is the peace Christ still brings.

White Gift Sunday is a beautiful reminder that peace grows when it is shared. Our gifts today—large or small—become signs of Christ's love reaching beyond our walls. They lift someone's burden, brighten someone's day, and remind someone in need that God has not forgotten them.

When we offer gifts with open hands, we become peacemakers. When we give with gratitude, we join God in healing the world. When we bless others, our own hearts are blessed in return. This is how peace becomes visible. This is how the light of Christ shines in the darkness.

As we continue in this season of waiting, each of us might hold these gentle questions: What in my life needs to be released so that I may know peace again? Whom do I need to forgive? What part of myself needs forgiving? Where is God inviting me to experience newness, healing, or calm?

Our human lives are full of things we cannot change. But they are also full of things we can change—with God's help. And God's peace gives us the courage to take even small steps toward a new beginning. Love has no limit. Peace has no limit. God's compassion has no limit. These are gifts that do not run out with age or time. They deepen, expand, and grow, often in the very places where we have been wounded.

May the peace of Christ—steady, tender, and enduring—enter every corner of our hearts this Advent. May we have the courage to release what burdens us, the grace to forgive, and the faith to welcome the Messiah who comes to guide us into wholeness. And may the gifts we share today become seeds of peace in someone else's life, shining with the love of God. Amen.
